"BBRP and the Expo: A Look Back" by Mary Bailey

Sometimes very good things happen by accident, and BBRP and the Expo seem to fall into that category. In 1978 a gentleman named Dick Peterson came to the Conservation Committee of the Minneapolis Chapter of the National Audubon Society for help. Dick had been featured in a Minneapolis Tribune article showcasing his amazing work in trying to bring back bluebirds to Minnesota and beyond with his carefully researched nestbox. He was swamped with requests for plans and could not keep up with them. Doreen Scriven and Mary Ellen Vetter were members of that committee, and they visited Dick's box locations and were very impressed with his work and success. They formed a committee of about eleven people, and BBRP was launched. Carrol Henderson from the DNR Nongame Wildlife Program was also enthusiastic about BBPR, and the young group benefited greatly from his help with funding for travel to interview successful bluebirders and for publishing their first book.

Jan and Dave Ahlgren joined the effort by helping make "free" Peterson boxes available to those who promised to send in reports. Few did. Besides designing the "Dick Peterson" style of nestbox, we are most grateful to Dick for his contribution in insisting that we "look in the box," thus, launching the concept of monitoring that is so vital to our efforts today.

In the early 1980's, BBRP became financially independent of the Audubon Chapter and the DNR Nongame Wildlife Program when they started charging a membership fee -- \$3 to start! Over 1,200 members hailed from all over the nation, and BBRP encouraged other states to launch their own state programs and shared samples of BBRP's best practices. Our membership dropped as a result, but the benefit has spread nationwide with the prolif-

eration of state bluebird organizations.

A natural outcome of this vibrant and enthusiastic momentum would be the inception of an annual gathering of bluebirders; thus, the first "conference" was held. About thirty people gathered for a half day and included state park naturalists, and they met at the Minneapolis Plymouth Congregational Church where the Audubon Chapter regularly met. Soon they held full-day conferences around the state to reach as many as possible, and attendance grew to over 300 people.

The name changed to Expo, but much of the flavor is the same today. Speakers cover a variety of topics in the natural realm and also deal in the specifics of bluebirding such as best practices and dealing with predators and Mother Nature. Sales and fundraisers such as the silent auction items and raffles and informational tables provide a break during the intermissions and lunch time. A very important side benefit of the Expo is getting to visit with fellow bluebirders that you have never met or haven't seen since the last Expo.

It is vital that we look back like this and see the foundations of today's success. Those mentioned above stepped out and did what was best for that little blue bird that we all cherish, and we all now benefit in ways they probably never envisioned. For their efforts we extend our sincere thanks to all who have given

BBRP such a fine start and heartfelt support through the years.

We will be offering the silent auction and raffle; everyone looks forward to this each year. We get wonderful items donated by you people and we appreciate all your efforts in this. 

Each year you all bring in such a lovely variety of cookies, this is appreciated so much. Our Cookie Ladies will be all ready to put them out for our coffee breaks.



Centennial Year for Migratory Bird Treaty

This is the Centennial Year for the Migratory Bird Treaty 1916-2016

100 Years of Migratory Bird Conservation Conserving Today's Birds for Tomorrow.



Why celebrate the Migratory Bird Treaty? The year 2016 marks the centennial of the Convention between the United States and Great Britain (for Canada) for the Protection of Migratory Birds (also called the Migratory Bird Treaty), signed on Aug. 16, 1916. The Migratory Bird Treaty, and three others that followed, form the cornerstones of efforts to conserve birds that migrate across international borders.

Migratory birds:

- connect people with nature and add beauty, sound and color to our world. They provide countless opportunities for enjoyment by birders, hunters, and outdoor enthusiasts and have cultural and spiritual importance.
- contribute environmental benefits, including pollination, insect and rodent control, and seed dispersal.
- are good indicators of environmental health because they are so visible and relatively easy to study. Studying birds can give us a picture of what is going on in the world.
- play a key role in the U.S. economy, supporting recreational opportunities that create jobs and generate billions of dollars in revenue.

AMAZING LITTLE BIRD, by Marilyn Suter

One day while observing the birds at the feeders out of my living room window, I noticed a chickadee was sitting on a branch all by itself. It was all fluffed up like it was not feeling good. The group of chickadees it comes with was busy taking seeds and flying into the tree and back and forth and this little bird just sat there. I checked on it on and off for a while and happened to be looking at it when it finally flew to a feeder. I noticed it was using its wings almost like it needed to do that for balance. I discovered this chickadee only has one leg and foot. I debated should I try and catch it and, if so, how would I do that and then what am I going to do with it. So I decided to make life as easy as possible



for this little one. I feed dry meal worms in a feeder and it will sit on that feeder for a period of time eating instead of taking one and flying into the tree. I feed "no mess" seed in another feeder with a bottom tray. There again it sits and eats. I also feed "pick out peanuts" in a feeder with a bottom tray. It eats there as well. I saw that when it goes to take a drink of water if the water level is down in the birdbath it just flies off versus if the water level is up it is able to drink.

This amazing little bird has no problem flying. I do not know if the chickadee was born this way or was in some sort of accident with a hawk or who knows what, but it sure tickles my heart to see it doing so well.


